A MESSAGE FROM YOUR SUPERVISOR Joseph D. Baltz

The chill of winter is almost past us, the days are getting longer, gardens are starting to grow and it is official, *spring is in the air.* After some incredible snow falls this winter, I would like to take this opportunity to thank our Highway Commissioner and Highway Department employees for a job well done during the blizzard of 2011 and throughout the entire winter season keeping our township roads plowed. After the long winter, I know the warmer weather is a welcome relief throughout the township.

The start of spring each year also brings the close of the township's fiscal year and approval of the budget for the next fiscal year. With that, I'd like to take this opportunity to review with you the financial strength of your township, talk a little about where your tax dollars go and the services the township provides.

The township will end the 2010-2011 fiscal year under budget. In fact, since elected in 1984 as Supervisor, this will be the 27th consecutive year that the township will end the fiscal year with a balanced budget. In an era of deficit spending in many areas of government, Troy Township takes great pride in this accomplishment.

As the Township Board of Trustees and I look to pass the 2011-2012 fiscal year budget, we will be taking a hard look at all expense items and asking ourselves from the tax payer's perspective, "How are these funds being spent?"

While there are many outdoor physical services that you can see being done, like the Township Highway Department's maintenance of roads and bridges, the township itself provides many services that your tax dollars support that you might not realize.

In fact, on an average real estate tax bill in Troy Township it is estimated that less than 1.3% of your total tax bill goes toward funding township services. Remember, townships fill a gap between local, county, state and federal government...

we are the government closest to the people.

About 4% of the tax dollars collected by the township fund the General Assistance Program; a program that provides temporary financial



assistance to those who qualify under the guidelines of the Township Supervisors of Illinois General Assistance Handbook. 54% of the tax dollars collected fund the Highway Department's budget, 30% fund the Town's budget and 12% fund the Assessor's budget.

The township office building is also home to the Troy Township Community Center which is used for the township seniors to gather in every Wednesday and Friday, the Joliet Quilters Guild meets there every Monday, T.O.P.S. Taking Pounds off Sensibly meets there on Thursdays and Tai Chi classes are available on Thursday afternoons. The community center also houses a Cyber Niche where residents can take one-on-one computer training with local volunteers. The community room is also available for rent to township residents for their own functions as well.

The township supports the PACE Dial-A-Ride bus service, mosquito abatement services and storm water management. Additionally the township provides both traditional and electronic recycling at our Highway Department, voter registration, notary public services and early voting for township residents.

On April 16th the township will host a shredding event FREE for township residents in an effort to help our community members protect themselves from identity theft. Again, this is a free event and you will find more information about it inside this newsletter.

Annual Town Meeting Set for April 12th



ASSESSOR NEWS Patricia A. Gabrielson, CIAO/I

Our office has begun work on the 2011 quadrennial reassessment. Although sales studies are done each year to determine any increase or decrease in values, the State requires by law that all

properties be reassessed every four years. Reassessment notices will be sent to all taxpayers from the Supervisor of Assessments some time in August and the date of the publication will be listed on that notice. Publication of our township's assessments will be in the Herald News. Please pay close attention to this reassessment notice. You have 30 days from the date of publication to file an appeal with the Board of Review.

We have received numerous calls regarding the Senior Citizen Homestead Exemption. It was reported on television that renewal forms were going to be sent out to seniors for the Senior Homestead Exemption. This only applies to Cook County Seniors. There are **no renewal forms for the Senior Homestead exemption required for Will County Seniors**. A renewal is only required for the Senior Assessment Freeze.

The Senior Citizens Assessment Freeze renewal forms will be sent out by the Supervisor of Assessments office at the end of March. The forms are light gray in color and are sent out to seniors already receiving the exemption or to those seniors who have just signed up for their senior exemption. If you do not receive a renewal form or if you believe you can qualify for the exemption, please call our office. To qualify for this exemption you must be 65 years old with a total household income below \$55,000.

Property tax bills will be sent out by the Treasurer's Office by May 1st. Please check your tax bill for **all** eligible exemptions. If an exemption is omitted, please contact our office at 815-744-5806. Tax bills are due in two installments, June 1st and September 1st.

Troy Township Proudly Sponsors "Ride the Rock"-Saturday, May 14th




To celebrate National Bike Month, the Forest Preserve will be hosting its fifth annual Ride the Rock bike tour. The 16-mile looped trail begins at I & M Canal Access on Houbolt Road/Empress Drive, then proceeds north to Joliet Junior College and Theodore Marsh in Crest Hill, before heading south along the Joliet Junction Trail to where it connects with the I &M Canal State Trail along Larkin Avenue and Route 6. The majority of the trail is paved, and includes some sidewalks and street routes. The degree of difficulty

is easy to moderate. Four rest stops will be available along the way. Pre-registration is recommended to assist with check-in. All early registrants will be entered into a raffle for a chance to win a bicycle. Although open to all ages, it is recommended that individual riders be at least 11 years of age. Senior Freeze Assessment Assistance – Monday, April 4th

Representatives from the Will County Supervisor of Assessments office will be at the Troy Township offices on Monday, April 4, 2011 from 10:00 a.m. until 2:00 p.m. to assist Troy Township seniors with the completion of their senior citizen assessment freeze application and all other renewable exemptions. Recycling Program Celebrating Three Successful Years!




This summer will mark the third anniversary of the Troy Township Recycling Program. Right here at the **Troy Township Highway Department**,


residents can drop off traditional recycling items like paper and plastic, as well as electronics

including computers, televisions, VCRs, radios, answering machines and electronic toys. All items with a computer chip will be allowed for drop off and once the items are placed in the containers they can not be removed. Items can be dropped off between 7:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. Monday through Friday.

This recycling program is made possible through the Township's partnership with the Will County Land Use Department and their willcountygreen.com initiative along with the hard work of dedicated **Troy Township Highway Department** staff members who monitor the collection site and assist residents with the drop off. of "weeds and grass" on their property. If you live in unincorporated Troy Township and have problems with a specific lot or residence, call the Township Office at 815-744-1968.


Annual Spring Clean-Up in Unincorporated Areas Only of Troy Township – April 4th thru 8th

Blizzard of February 2011

The Troy Township Highway Department is working with the Will County Emergency Management Agency and the State of Illinois as Governor Quinn asks the President to issue a disaster declaration for 60 counties and an emergency declaration for 43 counties; both of which include Will County. The Troy Township Highway Department was able to track all of our expenditures associated with the additional equipment and man hours needed to keep our township roads plowed during the storm and have submitted our figures in an effort to re-coup some of the expenses incurred during the storm.

TRIAD - What is it?
