Where do my property tax dollars go?

Taxes in Illinois are on the rise and no doubt, property taxes are of major concern to our residents. Most people are not even sure where their property tax dollars go or what services they receive. If you were to look at your property tax bill you would see a list of units of governments including schools (elementary, high school, and junior college), counties, cities, villages, fire districts, park districts, library districts, and more, all of whom receive a portion of your property tax dollars.

What am I paying the Township for and what does it do?

Township government is the oldest form of government in America originating with the Pilgrims in 1636. In 1849 the Illinois legislature authorized Illinois counties to adopt the township system of government and on April 2, 1850 Troy Township held its first election. Township government by law is tasked with three main functions:

- 1. Maintenance of roads and bridges in the unincorporated areas.
- 2. Assessing the value of all property within the township.
- 3. Providing General Assistance which is financial assistance for the indigent.

Beyond the three mandated services, township government provides other vital services to the residents in the community. Programs may vary from township to township but here at Troy Township we offer assistance with exemption and senior freeze paperwork, notary public services, durable medical equipment loan closet, temporary handicapped placards, a senior program, micro food pantry, early voting services, community center rental, educational seminars, recycling program, shredding and medication disposal events, a veteran's honor roll, unincorporated leaf vacuum service, unincorporated tree branch and brush pick up service, and much more.

Why do we still need township government?

Township government is under attack from our state legislature; however, townships perform vital functions. From the afore mentioned mandated functions of assessments, financial assistance to the indigent, and maintenance of roads in the unincorporated areas to the many varied social service programs, your local township government is the government

closest to the people. Townships do the most with the least amount of funds. We do all of this with most of our funding coming from general property taxes as the Township does not receive sales tax or income tax. In fact, on the home page of our website (www.troytownship.com) you will find links to two reports that discuss the importance of township government and its cost effective operations. How much do I pay Troy Township?

Looking at a property tax bill you will see that most of your property tax dollars go to local schools. Properties within Troy Township are made up of dozens of combinations of taxing bodies based on school boundaries, city or village boundaries, etc. To show you an example of how tax dollars break down by type of service, I looked at the taxing bodies for the area that the township office is located:

As you can see, Troy Township operates on a very small amount of property tax dollars and likely accounts for the smallest portion of your property tax bill. In this specific example, the

Township and Township Road District combined would receive 1.5% of every dollar paid or \$0.015 per \$1.00. For an \$8,000 property tax bill it would be a total of \$120.00*.

NEWS FROM ASSESSOR Kim Anderson

2019 was our quadrennial assessment year or general assessment year. Per state statute, quadrennial or general assessment years occur every four years. During those years, local township assessors must reassess every parcel in their township regardless of age, location, size or value of improvements. Every parcel within a township's jurisdiction will receive a notice in the mail from their respective county. <u>Please note: there are no</u> exemptions included in the market value on your reassessment notice. Quad years are times for the county to take an inventory of all taxable property and investigate them.

My staff and I conducted sales studies in our township and reviewed them for possible changes in value. Not all properties in Troy Township received a change but they were considered for a possible change dependent on market value sales as well as uniformity with comparable properties. Troy Township currently has 20,351 parcels located within our borders. This was no easy job, but it was completed in a timely manner and I must congratulate my staff on a job well done.

Just a reminder that if your value was increased it does NOT necessarily mean your property taxes will. Property taxes are the result of the demand of funds for our taxing bodies to fulfill their budget requirements. A property tax bill is figured by the assessed value, minus any exemptions, times the tax rate that is determined by the taxing bodies.

Troy Township has experienced increased market values over the last 4 years on average 5 1/2 percent. This is a positive thing as people are finding our area a desirable place to live and conduct business and those once foreclosed homes are now being resold.

As always, I encourage everyone to review your property card that is on file with my office. Information on your property can be found online at www.troytownship.com under the assessor tabproperty search or you may stop in to view your card in person. If an error would be found, they can be corrected. If the error would result in a change in your property value, we can go back one year to correct it.

Please always check your property tax bills to ensure you are receiving all the exemptions you are entitled to. This also can be corrected if an exemption would be missing or if you did not apply for one and were eligible the prior year. There is criteria that must be met for each exemption that is available to you. For a complete list of exemptions and their criteria, please visit our website under the assessor tab - and click on exemptions or please feel free to give us call at 815-744-5806.

All Township residents are always welcome to visit my office for any assistance that we can provide with regards to the value on your home or business and for assistance with exemptions. I am very fortunate to have a kind and knowledgeable staff that always welcome our residents into our office.

As the Town Clerk, one of my primary duties is to maintain the township records. With township business dating back to 1850, these records contain some great history. A few years back, with the help of a local historian/librarian, we started work on scanning the records so they can be maintained in a digital format. While the scanning process was completed a while back, for the records to be searchable and usable each image must be indexed; a very lengthy and cumbersome process. I try to spend time each day processing the information into a database. The process is ongoing and will take quite a bit of time. Our hope is to one day share these records on our website so that generations of township residents can have access to them and discover some of the great history of Troy Township.

As your Town Clerk I also serve as your Local Election Official. I cannot stress the importance of exercising your right to vote. The General Primary Election is coming up on March 17, 2020. This will decide who will be the Democratic and Republican candidates for the General Election to be held in November of 2020.

CENSUS DAY IS APRIL 1, 2020 UNITED STATES CENSUS 2020: WHY SHOULD IT MATTER TO ME?

Not only is the census data used to determine the number of legislative seats Illinois has in Washington or Springfield, it also determines the amount of federal money Illinois receives each year to support: Infrastructure needs such as construction and repair, schools and school districts in your community, hospitals and emergency healthcare centers for the insured and uninsured, social services programs that provide assistance for senior citizens, veterans and low-income families, and large companies' and

local business enterprises' decisions to potentially build or expand their corporate offices or factories that bring employment to communities.

The most important thing you can do is respond to the census questionnaire when you receive it. Your census questionnaire answers are kept confidential by the U.S. Census Bureau. CLEAN WATER IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS

The Clean Water Act Amendments of 1987 established the NPDES storm water program. The act called for implementation in two phases; Phase I addressed the most significant sources of pollution in storm water runoff while Phase II addresses other sources to protect water quality. With Phase II requirements, the Troy Township Highway Department was required to establish a Stormwater Management Program Plan. SERVICES FOR UNINCORPORATED AREAS OF TROY TOWNSHIP

LEAF VACUMMING

Starting the middle of October through November, Troy Township Highway Department will have the leaf vacuuming service for residents in the "unincorporated" areas of the township. Please do not bag the leaves. Residents must rake leaves to the edge of the street so the vacuum machine can reach them easily. Do not place leaves in ditches as the vacuum cannot reach leaves in ditch areas. Grass cuttings will not be picked up as we have no way of disposing them. Please be advised that the leaf vacuuming service may be put on hold with the occurrence of a snow or ice event.

BRANCH & BRUSH PICK UPS

The final branch and brush pick ups for this fall will be on Monday, October 7th, Monday, October 21st and Monday, November 4th. This service will resume at the beginning of May 2020 on the first and third Monday of each month.

WINTER SNOW REMOVAL REMINDER

Winter weather is just around the corner. Township trucks and road crews will be out plowing and salting the "unincorporated" road areas. We ask that the residents keep their vehicles off the streets when there has been a snowfall so the plows can safely and efficiently plow the streets and cul-de-sacs. Please use extra caution when driving near these vehicles as our trucks, plows and road crews are on the streets working for your safety.



SHREDDING EVENT AND MEDICATION DISPOSAL OCTOBER 5TH



Join us on Saturday, October 5, 2019, from 9:00 a.m. - 11:00 a.m. when Troy Township will host its next semi-annual shredding and medication disposal event. This event will take place simultaneously at 25448 Seil Road in Shorewood. Troy Township residents can bring their personal papers and documents to the township parking lot on the west side of the township offices and community center to be shredded onsite by Iron Mountain. Each resident must show proof of township residency and is allowed to have two letter size file or copy paper boxes shredded.

Troy Township is proud to once again partner with the Shorewood Police Department and will be offering medication disposal along with the shredding event. Township residents can bring their unneeded medication so that it can be disposed of properly. Make sure to bring only residentially generated medication items. No medications from businesses or doctor's offices will be accepted. Use a permanent marker to black out your name or personal information on the label.

NEEDLES APPROPRIATELY CONTAINED WITHIN AN APPROVED SHARPS CONTAINER WILL NOW BE ACCEPTED AT THE EVENT!

Bio-One has agreed to partner with us and will be onsite to collect and properly dispose of the needles. IMPORTANT.... only needles that are properly contained within an approved sharps container will be accepted. You can purchase approved sharps containers at most drug stores or pharmacies.


